Your telegram was a great surprise, & such a pleasant shock too, for we have had no word whatsoever from you since 30th. May. We got it on Saturday over the phone at 10.45 p.m. Rose & I were here alone, & were both asleep -

It was a lovely surprise, but we were terribly sorry not to be able to wire back to you directly, but could not make out where you were, & the next day being Sunday, & they have had much damage done at the G.P.O. so we just had to wait until it came through after things were righted. I don't know whether this letter will get through to you, for things are being so censored, or else the letters destroyed, that I do not like to ask
