My dearling Joe -

Your field card dated
30th. May by you & 2. June by
field post office, came this
morning - What delight it was to
see the piece of buff paper! & more
so to see the familiar signature
on it. I wish you say you have
not had a letter lately from me -
I am so sorry - but expect the posts
are all so out of joint, but I have
been writing every 2 or 3 days, as I
was afraid some would not get
delivered, I hope by now you have
had some of them - I told my
mum in my last letter that Daddy had
gone away for a "break". He was quite
ill with anguish about you, our dear
dear Sonnie - he was at Eastbourne
on Monday evening, so I am hoping

he may be there still, & I will get
Harry or Godwin to phone him &
tell him about this card of today, it
will be a comfort to him to know of it.
Stam Huggins called up yesterday
and asked how you were, thought
perhaps you had got home with some
of these evacuated ones, he said
he was not allowed to come further
from hospital than 3 miles, but he
would like so much to come & see us,
I thought of writing him & asking if he
would come for a night & the night show
the letter to the doctor or whoever
is in authority.

Mr. & Mrs. Huggins are here just now looking
after the house & Mrs. while Rosa
is on holiday - it makes a pleasant
change & they have a little grandson
8 yrs. old with them - he is a fine
sturdy little chap & so useful doing
little errands, & all sorts of stunts
in the garden - watering it, & getting
himself soaked is a very favourite

employment!! & Ginger is quite
friendly to him, it is so funny to see
them, he will kneel down on the
grass if Ginger is a little way off, &
beckon him to come with his fingers,
& it is so amusing to see Ginger come
"lolloping" along to him!

There was a letter from Stanley yesterday
he says Dr. Crofts is in England got back
with a convoy of wounded - he thinks he
may get leave for 2 days before going back
but he had not been up yet when Stanley
wrote - Stanley is very busy - billeting
officers it seems - & is trying to get homes
for about 300 children who are coming
there from evacuated districts
Everything is lovely - the sun shining
the flowers blooming -
"All the world is wonderful & only

Hitler is vile"
but nobody thinks or does anything
but getting on with the war, the works
are going day & night shift, & G.E.W.
are working 7 days a week, of 22 hrs.
per day.

I often wonder how your friends the
Abbadiers are, for I mentioned that
this town had been bombed.

I will send you some more shavers
as soon as regulations (postal) allow
of it. Puss. Cat has just jumped
up beside me & is cleaning himself
vigorously, & is most inconvenient for
writing. Are you still on the
same duties as when you were home.
